



## Determining a Tutoring Approach: Decision-Making Guide

**Purpose:** This tool helps districts identify the most effective tutoring approach by assessing their capacity.

### Part I: Understand and Compare the Three Tutoring Approaches

The three tutoring approaches are:

- Partner with a Proven Provider:** Collaborate with an established tutoring provider to implement a high-impact model while leveraging their expertise and resources.
- Build Your Own Program:** Build an in-house tutoring program using district resources and community talent for greater control over implementation and customization.
- Leverage Provider Expertise:** Combines district-led implementation with select external provider expertise to customize support and share responsibilities.

Partner With a Provider			
	Potential Advantages	Considerations	District Context Notes
<b>High-Quality Instructional Materials</b>	Proven success of the curriculum ensures a strong foundation for implementation.	Integration of the tutoring curriculum with the existing curriculum may present challenges.	
<b>Time</b>	Program implementation could potentially be quicker.	Availability of program type options (virtual vs. in-person) may be limited.	
<b>Capacity</b>	Use of external resources eliminates the need for existing district human resources. Recruitment, hiring, and training of tutors are done by a provider.	Tutor hiring processes may not adequately represent the diversity of the student population.  Quality is controlled externally, and student data-sharing protocols must be developed.

	Potential Advantages	Considerations	District Context Notes
<b>High-Quality Instructional Materials</b>	Easier integration with existing High-Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM).	Centralized monitoring is required to ensure consistency in implementation.	
<b>Time</b>	Greater district control over the detailed design and implementation process.	Quick start-up may be hindered by the hiring process, scheduling, curriculum development, and/or decision-making.	
<b>Capacity</b>	Increased opportunities for growth and pay for the existing talent pool.	Greater district responsibility for staffing, training, and program improvement.	



## Leverage Provider Expertise

This approach is a “Build Your Own” method that combines district-led implementation with select external provider expertise. If leaning toward “Build Your Own”, complete the [Build Your Own Flowchart](#).

Consider outsourcing one or more of the following to a tutoring provider:

- **Designing and implementing tutoring:** A partner can provide technical assistance when building your own program. This support might look like program development aligning with evidence-based practices, scaling and sustainability planning, or even addressing logistical or operational challenges.
- **Hiring staff:** A provider can assist in hiring staff for a high-impact tutoring program by offering expertise, resources, and a streamlined process to ensure the recruitment of qualified personnel.
- **Sourcing curriculum for tutoring:** A partner may provide a high-quality, evidence-based tutoring curriculum designed to align seamlessly with existing curricula and educational standards.
- **Supporting technology:** A provider can support technology by managing the platform provision and integration with existing systems. This can include training and support for users.
- **Housing data:** A partner may offer a data management system for data storage and provide training on its use, including data collection, analysis, and interpretation to evaluate program effectiveness.

<b>Focus Area</b>	<p><b>Think it through!</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● Can all student groups benefit from the current district resources, or would some student groups be excluded?</li><li>● Can existing resources be adapted to support multilingual learners, students with disabilities, or those in alternative settings?</li></ul> <p><b>✓ Key Question:</b></p> <p><b>If YES</b> → Consider <b>building your own program</b></p> <p><b>If NO</b> → Consider <b>partnering with a provider</b></p>
<b>High-Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM)</b>	<p><b>Think it through!</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● Can the existing curriculum be adapted for tutoring?</li><li>● Do potential partners offer a curriculum that aligns with district needs?</li><li>● Can external materials supplement district resources for a blended approach?</li></ul> <p><b>✓ Key Question:</b> Does the district have existing high-quality instructional materials that can be integrated into tutoring?</p> <p><b>If YES</b> → Consider <b>building your own program</b> and training tutors to align with district standards.</p> <p><b>If NO</b> → Consider <b>partnering with a provider</b> that offers structured, research-based instructional resources.</p>
<b>Timeframe</b>	<p><b>Think it through!</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● Does the district need an RFP to partner with a provider?</li><li>● Can the district recruit and train tutors within the timeframe?</li><li>● Can tutoring be scheduled without disrupting core instruction?</li></ul> <p><b>✓ Key Question:</b> How soon does the district need to launch tutoring?</p> <p><b>If FLEXIBLE (e.g., planned for next year)</b> → A <b>build your own or leveraging tutor expertise</b> may allow time to recruit, train, and integrate tutoring effectively.</p> <p><b>If FAST (e.g., within the current school year)</b> → <b>Partnering with a Provider</b> may be the best option for quick implementation.</p>



Capacity	<p><b>Think it through!</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Does the district have HR capacity for hiring and onboarding tutors?</li><li>• Can the district provide high-quality professional development?</li><li>• Are systems in place for data tracking and continuous improvement?</li></ul> <p>✓ <b>Key Question:</b> Does the district have the capacity to recruit, train, and oversee tutors?</p> <p><b>If YES</b> → A <b>build your own program</b> could be a strong option, allowing direct oversight and alignment with district priorities.</p> <p><b>If NO</b> → <b>Partnering with a provider</b> can <b>reduce administrative burden</b> while ensuring tutor quality.</p>
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Scenario	Recommended Approach
Strong internal instructional resources + available staffing + flexible timeline	<b>Build Your Own Program</b> (Develop tutoring program in-house)
Limited internal resources + need for quick implementation + need for structured curriculum	<b>Partner with a Provider</b> (Contract with an external tutoring organization)
Some internal capacity + need for external support with curriculum/tutors + phased implementation	<b>Leverage Provider Expertise:</b> (Blend in-house tutoring with provider support)
