Implementing High-Impact Tutoring using Paraprofessionals

BRIEF SUMMARY



For districts and schools considering tutoring, paraprofessionals are a powerful option.

When properly trained, paraprofessionals can serve as highly effective tutors. Research shows that high-impact tutoring by paraprofessionals demonstrates significant positive impacts on student achievement—particularly in lower grades —and may be **more effective than programs with nonprofessional or volunteer tutors**. How to Make It Happen

- Staffing: Adapt existing roles or create new positions. Establish new job codes and descriptions for flexibility.
- **Funding**: Apply for U.S. Department of Education grants and other funding sources to support tutoring programs.
- **Training and Coaching**: Inform, recruit, and support paraprofessionals through targeted outreach, training, and coaching.
- **Implementation and Improvement**: Pilot programs, communicate clearly, and collect and analyze data regularly to ensure effective implementation.

What Has Worked in Other Schools

- **Baltimore City Public Schools** used 48 paraprofessional tutors in 38 schools and tutored over 1,400 students, doubling their growth rate in reading.
- **DC Public Schools** partnered with the University of Oregon to deliver math tutoring by adjusting the duties and schedules of existing para-teacher aides.
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Oakland Unified School District hired community members as paraprofessional literacy tutors in all elementary schools.
